Review of Mail and Other Correspondence: 04/21/2020

1. San Luis Valley Irrigation District sent an update on the 2020 Irrigation Season. (Received April 13, 2020)

Njal Schold sent an email regarding public input on security and law enforcement in the Crestone/ Baca Community. The Crestone/Baca community is the largest concentration of homes and businesses in Saguache County. The Crestone/Baca area, Saguache, Center and other residential and commercial properties are the primary sources of revenue for the county. Saguache County receives over 60% of its property tax revenue from Crestone/Baca residential and commercial property taxes. Considering this, we would like to see a proportional amount of resources be allocated for housing for a deputy and a more proactive deputy presence in the community funded from this tax base. We have seen a rash of thefts that seem to be increasing as the area is growing. Recently, on the evening of March 22, 2020 there was vandalism done at multiple sites, including at religious retreat centers that form a significant part of Crestone's unique culture, as well as tourist revenue. Just this year we have seen more homes broken into. Earlier this week a speeding car on Camino del Rey endangered a crew from Baca Water and Sanitation working along the road to repair a water leak. There was a theft of an ATV from the Tashi Gomang stupa (which was recovered thanks to citizen activism and Sheriff Department speedy response). There continue to be issues with individuals harassing people innocently walking on the public roads even after Sheriff's contact, drug use continues to be an issue along with homelessness and illegal camping issues which continue to be a potential problem source. The Crestone/Baca area is referred to by many as "lawless". There is no deputy presence in this area. Upon occasion either the Colorado State Patrol or the Saguache Sheriff Department will show up to hand out tickets to speeders; that's fine but it seems to be pretty easy pickings. What the community needs is a presence. Even more than a presence is having someone engaged in and part of the community, getting to know the community and vice versa. The criminal element knows that there is no presence of the Saguache Sheriff Department in this community so feel comfortable to act without fear of apprehension. We have attracted the sort of criminal element that now owns property here, dealing hard and soft drugs in the community which may encourage users to take advantage of the lack of law enforcement locally and engage in theft. The county as a whole is growing and a major part of that growth is happening in the Crestone/Baca area. Crime is an increasing problem that often comes along with growth. We need a sheriff presence to ensure the safety of citizens and properties. In the past, the City of Crestone helped to provide housing for a deputy in the town. Recently, there was an attempt to house two deputies in the area and that failed, unfortunately. There is a need to continue to find a solution despite these failures. Locally, a substation for the county sheriff was created and donated next door to the grocery store in Crestone. It has yet to be used. A water connection was also donated by the Baca Water and Sanitation District to facilitate the housing of a deputy in Casita Park. In the fall of 2018, there was a 1.5% sales tax increase earmarked for the Sheriff's Department, and many in this area supported the increase in hopes that it would facilitate a solution to the lack of law enforcement. Why has there been no visible benefit to this community? Talk around the community is that the county doesn't care about this area; law enforcement doesn't care about it, suggesting that it's too far to drive to among other things. Suggestions such as, let's return to the old west and let the community deal with meth users and dealers that we know live in our area, burn down the house and run them out of town have been heard. Last week, in conversation, a suggestion was made that the county could deputize retired community members with previous law enforcement experience, giving them the power to arrest to help put an end to the lawlessness here. This community is unique and quite diverse in its demographic and tends to be a very open and forgiving community with many acts of kindness toward those in need. This is something we who live here

appreciate. We are asking the Saguache County Commission to engage with the Sheriff's Department, Baca Grande POA, the city of Crestone, and the Crestone/Baca community to develop a plan to address this issue of the lack of security and presence of law enforcement. (Received April 13, 2020)

Dear Commissioners,

I want to thank you all for your leadership and care for our community members during the Covid-19 crisis. You are making decisions and dealing with situations you never could have anticipated. You are on the front lines of making our county safe, and I thank you. I personally am closely watching the handling of the public health crisis both by the Governor and you, our Commissioners. I am heartened that you have demonstrated a commitment to timely preventative action. The Tourism Council looks forward to supporting positive communication with our small businesses, visitor site managers, and communities in coordination with you during the months ahead. We want to help our county to navigate our current reality with a steady hand, and also to prepare for the future in coordination with you and public health directives. In light of these intentions, here is what I know about the charging station grant: The state is flexible in how we may choose to move forward. We can move forward on all three stations, or alternatively they will allow us to accept just one station first, and put off acceptance and installation of the other two for the future. The work on the project can begin either immediately, or it can begin after July 1, the next fiscal year. Any positive action by the County will allow the Tourism Council to begin communication with contractors to be ready when stay-at-home and other restrictive orders are lifted. The state asks for completion of the project in 6 months, but under the circumstances they realize that this may not happen. Our sense is that we just need to communicate to show that we remain committed to the project. The Tourism Council is committed to overseeing this project and communicating with the state as needed. A single station requires an outlay by the county of about \$7,000, of which 80% will be reimbursed by the state. If you choose to begin with a single installation, I would ask that the Tourism Council be allowed to work with the localities to determine which station would be installed first. My primary criterion would be to select the locale with the highest likelihood of an easy installation and successful first step. If no funding commitment of any sort is possible for the County at this time, I would like to like to explore other options to make this a win for the county: I would like for the Tourism Council to announce that we won the award, and to make the public aware of the difficulties that the county is facing that preclude forward movement on this project. I want to use this award as an opportunity to communicate to the public that we are a forward-thinking and united community, even in the face of challenges, and that we are united in our

concern for our community members. Covid-19 is reminding us that Colorado blue skies are important and worth protecting. Have you noticed how much bluer the skies are since the stay at home order? This electric charging station grant is an important step to protecting our skies. Covid-19 is also challenging us to reprioritize and to move forward with important projects. I hope to work together to find paths forward with you. The Tourism Council remains supportive and positive in our endeavors, and wants to work in concert with the best interests of the county. Please know that the Tourism Council will follow all state and county public safety orders when executing projects. Public safety is key to tourism. We see the grant for the charging stations as an opportunity for tourism to extend important outreach to our towns in a spirit of unity and mutual connectedness. We look forward to working inside our communities at this time when we cannot direct our energies outward. This situation is taking an emotional toll on us all. I hope that you each are finding ways for your own rejuvenation during this time.

Public Comment:

Lisa Cyriacks thanked the commissioners for making the meetings available online. Cyriacks wanted to second Mr. Scholds comments about facilitating a need. People walk in and perceive that there isn't law enforcement. There is code enforcement patrolling Crestone for dogs and that is about it. Cyriacks encourages the board to move forward with the grant to get the charging stations. It would facilitate more tourism in the future.

4/9 – Attended via internet an Economic Development Meeting with the President of Colorado Banks and the head of the Small Business Development Association.

Attended via internet the Southern District Meeting of CCI, items of note:

The Census is going well for some areas of the state, with an average of 53% compliance. The high in the valley is Alamosa at around 47%. Saguache County is at 15.4%.

There has been some concern that the CARE funds from the Federal Government were not going to smaller counties (larger counties saw money coming directly to them). The Governor has stated this is not true.

There was a request that counties write letters to the federal government for more funding.

Attended twice weekly meetings with DOLA for updates on the COVID-19 situation.

Attended daily briefings from the Governor's office.

Had conversations with the Commissioners from Mesa and Montezuma County.

4/8 – Received a call from Costilla County Commissioner Lawrence Pacheco on their closing of roads to several reservoirs and the possible impact to surrounding counties from residents from other places not

abiding by the social distancing order. Mr. Pacheco said they have people from other counties and out of state (New Mexico) at their reservoirs.

In the afternoon I watched and listened to the District CCI Meeting.

4/9 – Received a call from Public Health Director, Lynette Grant, on the number of positive cases of COVID-19 in Saguache County.

4/10 – Contacted the schools in Saguache County about the Sales Tax Grant informing them that money is available for use for snack programs during the pandemic. I was informed that schools would be reimbursed for the meal and the program they are using to meet the needs of the children.

4/13 – Contacted Frank Maestas, the VSO from Alamosa County on the progress of Saguache County hiring a Veterans Service Officer.

Visited with a constituent from District 3 regarding the sales tax grant, and when they would be rewarded. Received a call from a constituent that owns a small business and they were inquiring when Saguache County would be amending the Public Health Order to partially open the County.

4/14 – Met Interim Land Use Administrator, Amber Wilson, and Commissioner Jason Anderson, in Villa Grove and conducted a site visit at Teajuana, LTD, on their application to modify the THC business and add a CBD portion in the same building.

After the site visit, I drove several county roads, since I had received multiple complaints. Roads that I drove were County Road AA, County Road T, County Road 52, and County Road 50.

4/16 – Received a call from a small business owner inquiring when the Public Health Order would be lifted.

Met with a resident on the concerns they had about blight in Saguache County.

Received a call from Commissioner Gene Glover, from Rio Grande County, requesting to set up a possible zoom meeting and have discussion on the Health Order, and opening up possible areas of Rio Grande and Saguache Counties.

4/20 – Received a call from multiple constituents on the conditions of County Roads, and it appears to them the north end of the county is getting shorted on maintenance of the roads.

Called and listened to the San Luis valley Regional update with various agencies from the San Luis Valley.

Also listened to the Governor's comments at 12:30 yesterday.

Spoke with Mr. Bobby Woelz, Saguache County OEM.

4/17 – Received an email from the Tomichi Creek Trading Post, requesting the County amend a portion of the Public Health Order.

AMBER WILSON, INTERIM LAND USE ADMINISTRATOR, Report Attached

1. Teajuana, LTD / Cynthia E. Hansen – Conditional Use Modification request – 34093 Hwy. 285 – Villa Grove, Block 1, Lot 6

Teajuana, LTD is currently approved for THC infused products. They have been up and running since March 29, 2017

They are now requesting to add CBD infused products to their business and split the building into two separate facilities. Both facilities will be completely separate with one side of the building being strictly THC infused products and the other side will be strictly CBD infused products. There will be a door inside the building that can access either facility that will have cameras on the THC side. They will be packaging each of the products on their own sides and will be separate businesses.

They had one letter of support that was received.

The Planning Commission recommended unanimous approval as presented at their February 27th meeting.

UPDATED INFORMATION

Commissioner Jason Anderson, Commissioner Tim Lovato and Interim Land Use Wilson attended a site visit on April 14th with Cindy Hansen and Jeremy Tidwell. There were concerns about there being a secured locked door on the interior of the facility that can access either the THC side and the proposed CBD side and it not being totally separate businesses. There were also concerns about fire exists on the THC side of only having one access if there was to ever be a fire in the building.

The Commissioners have allowed Ms. Hansen and Mr. Tidwell to request what route they would like to take, to come up with a solution that the Commissioners could act upon.

Tidwell stated that the door would only be open in case of an emergency and an alarm would go off which will unlock the door.

Commissioner Lovato stated that he would like to see them as two separate facilities, which was stated in the letter.

2. Violations and Court Citations

A lot of complaints have been received in the County and mostly in the Mineral Hot Springs about people living in campers, buses and not having proper sanitation. Currently, with how our regulations read, we cannot move forward with summoning people to Court. All our office can do right now is to keep taking pictures and giving citations. People are catching on and still not complying. We need to move forward with getting our Code updated with the Violations and Penalties so we can get our violations under control.

There have been complaints about lights on County Road 41G. Code Enforcement has pictures, but it is lights at each neighbor both are out of compliance. They have been feuding with each other. Land Use can only address the light issue.

Code Enforcement Officer Alejandro Heredia stated that once he got the photographs of the property, it seemed to appear the lady's lights were brighter. She stated that the lights were pointed in her window. She wants him to get a citation, Heredia believes both should receive a citation.

Attorney Gibbons stated that his recommendation would be to send a violation letter to both parties. They are not complying with the dark sky regulation. Gibbons suggested giving them a certain time frame to comply then follow up on it.

Heredia stated he has documented the times he has gone out to Mr. Klein's property in Mineral Hot Springs. Heredia has given 3 citations and has not heard back. Heredia is not sure how to move forward. Attorney Gibbons stated there is a public health statute, public health has the ability to issue a cease and assist order for violations of state and public health regulations.
